We are glad you have chosen to attend Gannon University and we look forward to your arrival on campus for Summer Orientation 2013.



PC Applications Challenge Test

All students who are Computer Science, Information Systems, Software Engineering or Bioinformatics majors are required to take the four components of the PC Applications Challenge Test identified below. The test will be administered during the Summer Orientation program.

CIS 170 Operating Systems and Internet

CIS 171 Word Processing (Word)

CIS 172 Electronic Spreadsheet (Excel)

CIS 173 Database (Access)

Students in all other majors who are scheduled to take any of the above PC application courses or CIS 150 Business Technology 1 in the fall semester have the option to take a test component. You will be informed during orientation whether you are scheduled to take any of the PC application courses your first semester. Then, you will have the choice to take the PC Applications Challenge Test.

The test will be given on the Monday afternoon of each orientation session beginning at 3:00 p.m. Average test time will vary from 30 minutes to 90 minutes depending on the number of test components taken.

Note: Students do not earn credit for successful completion of a component. They receive satisfaction of the requirement with respect to the curriculum. The results are used to place students properly in first semester courses.



Arrival

All participants

Report to Finegan Hall, 124 W. 5th St. (on campus map, page 9) between 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. for registration. You will receive an information packet including a detailed program schedule. If you are staying in the residence hall during orientation you will also check into your room at this time.

After you have registered

All participants should report to the Campus Police & Safety Office (lower level, west entrance of Harborview House) at 210 W. 6th St. (on the campus map, page 9) between 1:15 and 3:15 p.m. to have your ID photo taken.

How to get to Gannon

From I-90

- Take the I-79 North exit, travel north on I-79, and follow the signs to the Bayfront Parkway.
- Continue on the Bayfront Parkway along Presque Isle Bay and past the marinas. Continue through the blinking yellow light to State St. Turn right onto State St. at the light.
- Proceed south on State St. through the downtown district to West 5th St. Turn right on West 5th St. and travel one block to Peach St. Continue on West 5th St. about one-half block and Finegan Hall will be on your right.

From I-79

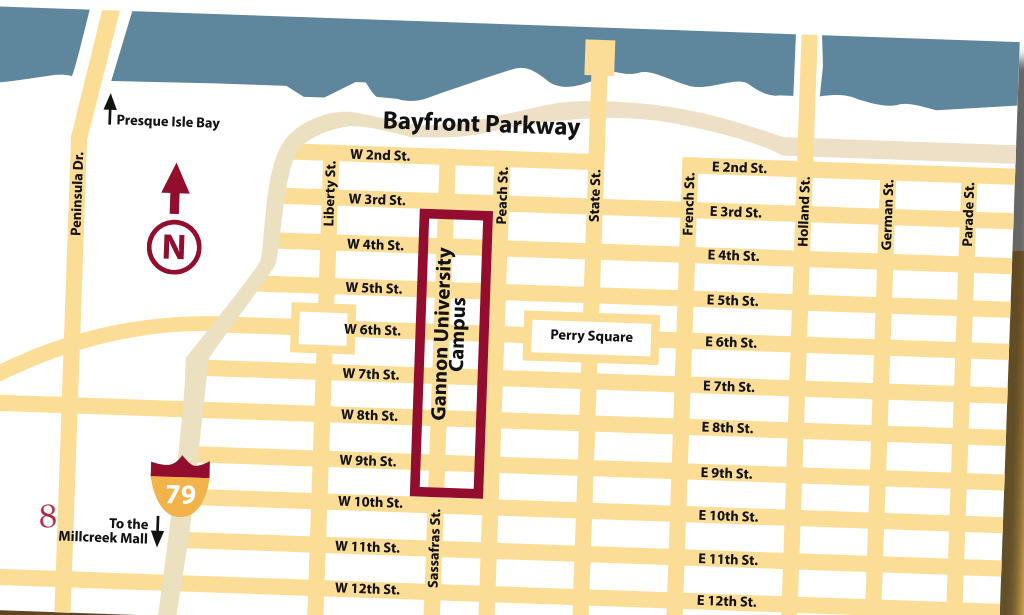
- Travel north on I-79 and follow signs to Bayfront Parkway. (Continue with directions indicated above for travel on the Bayfront Parkway.)

Parking

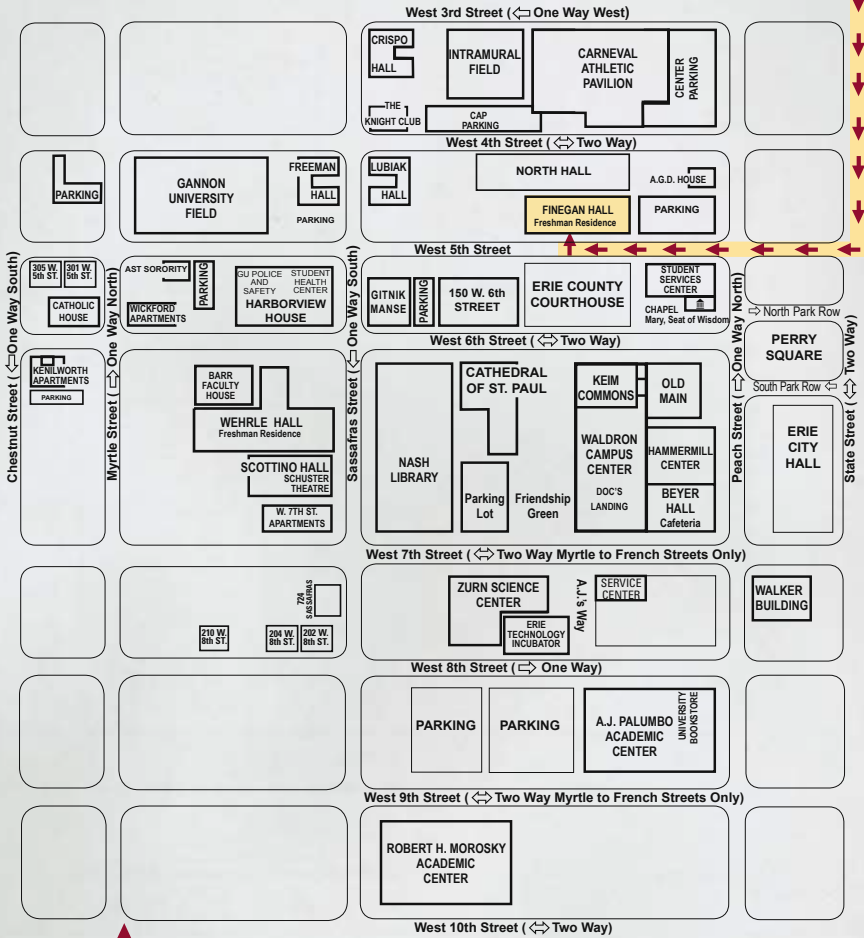
A parking pass will be available to orientation participants at the registration area on Sunday. The pass will be valid for the duration of the program and will enable you to park in the Municipal Ramp in the 700 block of Peach St. The parking pass should be hung from your rearview mirror.

You may park on the street in front of Finegan Hall for unloading luggage only. You will then be directed to parking facilities.

Reservation procedures

When making your reservation request, please keep the following in mind:

- We recommend you register for orientation as soon as possible.
- Due to limited spaces at each session, orientation is for students and parents only and reservations are processed on a first-come first-served basis. Reply early for a better opportunity to receive your first-choice session.
- If any special accommodations are required due to a disability, please contact us in advance.

Complete the enclosed card according to these instructions. Please print.

- Fill in your name, address, phone, gender and e-mail.
- Indicate your first and second choice of sessions.
- Fill in your academic program (refer to list on page 17).
Please note: Undecided and Undeclared are different major classifications.
- List those persons who will be attending orientation with you. Please indicate their relationship to you (i.e., mother, father), and if they are alumni, please list their graduation year.
Please note: only students and their parents will be permitted to reside in the residence hall.
- Select an option for you and your parent(s) who will attend orientation (refer to page 11.)
- Enter amount of check/money order enclosed.
Please note: check/money order should be made payable to Gannon University.

Return reservations by June 14, 2013. Reservations will be accepted after the deadline; however, we cannot guarantee that space will be available for specific dates.

Confirmation of reservations

A confirmation letter will be sent to you with final program information as soon as possible. Please allow two to three weeks. In the case that correspondence time is limited, our office will contact you by telephone or e-mail.

Refund policy

Reservations must be cancelled two weeks prior to each session. All refunds will be processed after Aug. 1, 2013.

Program options

Option A: \$65 per person

Reside on campus. Erie students and parents are also welcome to select this option. Cost per session includes one night's housing, three meals (including dinner on Sunday and breakfast and lunch on Monday), all social activities and orientation materials.

Option B: \$40 per person

Commute to campus. Cost per session includes dinner on Sunday, lunch on Monday, and all social activities and orientation materials.

Calculation of Costs

Additional Expenses

Please note, there will be a \$10 photo ID fee due in the Campus Police and Safety Office when your picture is taken. Also, be prepared for any other personal expenses such as bookstore purchases, etc.





What to bring to orientation

Casual attire is appropriate for all orientation activities.

Many presentations are given in an air conditioned lecture hall. You might want to bring a light sweater or jacket in case you find the temperature too cool.

Students and parents staying in the residence hall during summer orientation will be housed separately, so individual suitcases are recommended. All housing will be dormitory-style with separate community bathrooms for men and women.

Sheets, pillowcases, and towels will be furnished. Participants staying in the residence hall must furnish their own pillows, blankets, washcloths, soap and toiletries during orientation.

Since parents and students will occupy separate areas of the residence hall, it will be difficult to share toiletries, clocks, etc.
