Archbishop Desmond Tutu at GU April 12

Archbishop Desmond Tutu will speak at Gannon University April 12 as the final installation of the university’s annual Distinguished Speaker Series’ 75th anniversary edition.

Tutu, an international religious leader and Nobel Peace Prize winner who currently is a visiting professor at Emory University, will deliver a free lecture beginning at 7:30 p.m. in Gannon’s Hammermill Center.

He will be presented with the Gannon University Ut Diligatis Invicem Award. Translated, the title means “That you love one another.”

The archbishop’s visit is a highlight of Gannon’s 75th Anniversary Celebration taking place during the 1999-2000 academic year.

Currently, Tutu is chancellor of the University of the Western Cape and resides in Atlanta, Ga., and is the Robert W. Woodruff Visiting Professor at Emory University.

He’s back: Erie native, C-Span political editor to address Chautauqua at Gannon

Erie native and C-Span producer Steve Scully will be the featured speaker April 11 for the Spring 2000 Chautauqua at Gannon lecture, which is free and open to the public.

The event also will include a celebration for Daniel Bratton, president of Chautauqua Institution, who is retiring.

Scully, C-Span’s Campaign 2000 political editor and senior executive producer for the network, will speak on “Campaign 2000: Lessons Learned and What’s Ahead,” based on his fieldwork in all of the major primaries and caucuses this year. Scully began his career as a reporter at WSEE-TV Ch. 35 in Erie.

Included in this event will be a celebration of the tenure of Daniel Bratton, Ph.D., president of the Chautauqua Institution, Chautauqua, N.Y., who is retiring after 16 years as president. Bratton has been instrumental in fostering a long and friendly affiliation between Gannon University and Chautauqua Institution.

Free and open to the public, the lecture will be from 7:30 to 9 p.m. in Zurn 104. A reception will follow.
