Former FBI special agent focus of Nov. 7 lecture

A "day-in-the-life" of one of the FBI's most outstanding women will be the topic Nov. 7 for the third installment of Gannon's Distinguished Speaker Series.

Candice DeLong has been called a real-life Clarice Starling and a female Donnie Brasco, characters popularized in recent hit movies. She has been on the front lines of some of the FBI's most gripping and memorable cases, including being chosen as one of three agents to carry out the manhunt for the Unabomber in Lincoln, Mont. DeLong has tailed terrorists, gone undercover as a gangster's moll, and posed as the madam for a call-girl ring.

Now, for the first time, DeLong reveals the dangers and rewards of being a woman on the front lines of the world's most powerful law enforcement agency.

Now retired, DeLong offers a "day-in-the-life" glimpse of her work as a field profiler, one of the most fascinating and challenging branches of the FBI. She traces the unusual career path that led her to crime fighting and recounts the incredible obstacles she faced as a woman, single mother and fledgling agent.

A portrait of courage and grace under fire, DeLong's talk offers a missing chapter in the annals of law enforcement and a dramatic and often funny picture of a woman who has dedicated her heart and soul to the crusade against crime.

DeLong has written a book, *Special Agent*, which takes readers systematically through the profiling process and shows how she helped to solve a number of difficult, high profile cases.

DeLong was, until her retirement in July 2000, the head field profiler in San Francisco for the FBI. She has served as the liaison to the bureau's world famous Behavioral Science Unit at Quantico and, as a member of the Child Abduction Task Force, lectured widely on such issues as protecting women and children and preventing sexual abuse.

The free talk, sponsored by Gannon's student-run Activities Programming Board, will begin at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 7 in Zurn 104.

Terrorism seminar offered

Gannon University will continue its Risk Manager-in-residence Program Nov. 7 with a focus on terrorism.

John Rath, director of risk management for Milwaukee County, Wisc., will present a seminar on "Exposure Due to Terrorism: A Risk Management Perspective on Corporate and Municipal Risk Exposure." The program also will include several local experts.

Joining Rath will be Nick Sleptzoff, director of the Erie County Emergency Management Agency; Agent Bob Rudge of the FBI's Erie office; and Margaret Potter, manager of the Reinsurance Department at Erie Insurance, among others.

Topics will include the goals, strategies and actions of Milwaukee County; prevention of terrorism; identifying risk, analyzing losses, and resolving economic loss; evaluating property and claims professionals; the Federal Emergency Management Agency; and whether the Erie region is at risk for terrorism.

The program, featuring a morning seminar, is geared toward students and practicing professionals in the risk management and insurance industries.

The speaker program is being funded through a \$3,500 grant from the Spencer Educational Foundation Inc. of New York City to again offer a Risk Manager-in-Residence speaker series.

Rath, the featured speaker, has held his current position since 1990. He is responsible for risk financing and claims administration for property and casualty exposure, in addition to safety and loss control.

Prior to his association with Milwaukee County, he was director of risk management for the Archdiocese of Los Angeles from 1986-90. His career began in the insurance industry and progressed into senior claim management with the Hartford Insurance Group.

He holds the professional designations of casualty claims law associate, chartered property casualty underwriter, associate in claim, associate in risk management, and chartered life underwriter.

The Nov. 7 seminar will begin at 8 a.m. with registration in the Yehl Alumni Room. The program will adjourn at 11:45 a.m.
